for ages has been hidden in God, who created all things; 10 in order that the manifold wisdom of God might now be made known through the church to the rulers and the authorities in the heavenly places. 11 This was in accordance with the eternal purpose which He carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, 12 in whom we have boldness and confident access through faith in Him. NASB

The church is a "city on a hill," the very "light of the world," carrying the good news of the Gospel to each generation and powerfully displaying God's glory by the way we live our lives!

Matthew 5:14-16 - 14 "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. 15 "Nor do men light a lamp, and put it under the peck-measure, but on the lampstand; and it gives light to all who are in the house. 16 "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven. NASB

2 Corinthians 3:2-5 - 2 You are our letter, written in our hearts, known and read by all men; 3 being manifested that you are a letter of Christ, cared for by us, written not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone, but on tablets of human hearts. 4 And such confidence we have through Christ toward God. 5 Not that we are adequate in ourselves to consider anything as coming from ourselves, but our adequacy is from God, NASB

Now summing up the relation of faith to sanctification, and how God through the Word and by the Spirit is changing us, let us consider 2 Peter 1:2-11. Let us see here how God richly supplies for us the **indicatives** of the **Word** (the promises), and how the Spirit uses these as the resource to motivate the **imperatives** in our lives and change us in our character and behavior so that we "become partakers of the divine nature," being conformed into the image of Christ. 2 Peter 1:2-4 describes the resources that are ours through "the true knowledge God" and provide for us "everything" we need to be like Christ (godliness). Also how through Word, here the "magnificent and precious promises," we might "become partakers of the divine nature," which is another way of describing being changed into the image and likeness of God.

2 Peter 1:2-4 - 2 Grace and peace be multiplied to you in the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord; 3 seeing that His divine power has granted to us everything pertaining to life and godliness, through the true knowledge of Him who called us by His own glory and excellence. 4 For by these He has granted to us His precious and magnificent promises, in order that by them you might become partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world by lust. NASB

These verses, 2-4, are **indicatives** telling us of the wonderful **resources**, **and power**, **and process** that are ours in the "**true knowledge of God**" and the "**magnificent and precious promises**." Then when we get to verses 5-8, we see a section of imperatives which are firmly rooted in these indicative promises of verses 2-4. As we **believe**, that is **exercise our faith**, out of the abundance of resources that are ours in faith, (that is the true knowledge of God), we are able by "**His divine power**" (divine enablement) to appropriate the resources to experience and exercise the very virtues of God, that is the "**divine nature**."

2 Peter 1:5-8 - 5 Now for this very reason also, **applying all diligence**, in your faith supply moral excellence, and in your moral excellence, knowledge; 6 and in your knowledge, self-control, and in your self-control, perseverance, and in your perseverance, godliness; 7 and in your godliness, brotherly kindness, and in your brotherly kindness, love. 8 For **if these qualities are yours and are increasing, they render you neither useless nor unfruitful in the true knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ**. NASB

And so the imperative is to "put on" the "divine nature" of "moral excellence, and in your moral excellence, knowledge; 6 and in your knowledge, self-control, and in your self-control, perseverance, and in your perseverance, godliness; 7 and in your godliness, brotherly kindness, and in your brotherly kindness, love." In this we are to "apply all diligence," or if you will, exert God dependent effort. This is because you apply this diligence "in your faith" or out of the resources of your faith, the very resources described in verses 2-4. The imperatives of verses 5-8 are grounded in the indicatives of verses 2-4. So God does not expect you to create the virtues in yourself with your own ability or the arm of flesh, but rather by believing and

exercising faith, supply out of that faith the virtues of God's divine nature. "In your faith supply moral excellence." That is, exert God dependent effort by drawing upon the resource of God's power and nature, supplying it out of your faith, and put on "moral excellence." And to this of course we are to add "knowledge; 6 and in your knowledge, self-control, and in your self-control, perseverance, and in your perseverance, godliness; 7 and in your godliness, brotherly kindness, and in your brotherly kindness, love." See here by believing the promises (the Word), that these resources of God are ours, we apply diligence to put them on, and become partakers of the divine nature ourselves, having appropriated them by faith. See here the relation of faith to Sanctification. Faith is vital to the appropriation of divine resources for God's purpose of image bearing to come to full fruition. And if we simply obey this imperative, God says we will be a fruitful and effective Christian. "For if these qualities are yours and are increasing, they render you neither useless nor unfruitful in the true knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ." In verse 9-11 He reaffirms that this fruit bearing is grounded in the Gospel (v-9), and through our diligence in faith, grant us an abundant experience of assurance in our faith (v-10), as we see the demonstration of His divine nature in our experience.

2 Peter 1:9-11 - 9 For he who lacks these qualities is blind or short-sighted, having forgotten his purification from his former sins. 10 Therefore, brethren, be all the more diligent to make certain about His calling and choosing you; for as long as you practice these things, you will never stumble; 11 for in this way the entrance into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ will be abundantly supplied to you. NASB

Notice how in verse 9, "if you lack these qualities" he says, you are "blind and short-sighted," that is, "having forgotten your purification from former sins." Here he explains that a Christian who bears little fruit has little cognitive remembrance or knowledge of the richness of our forgiveness in Christ and the Atonement. He has "forgotten" how clean he has become through the Gospel, and instead of living in an appropriating the resources that are ours through the Gospel, we wallow in the mire and muck of a fruitless and lacking Christian life. Our faith or belief in the Gospel is greatly lacking and this lack or unbelief is the root and core of the problem of a fruitless and ineffective Christian life. If you lack "these qualities" (the virtues of verse 6-7), you are "blind" to the richness of the Gospel and what is yours in Christ, and have "forgotten your purification from former sins." But on the contrary if you believe with lively faith and therefore apply diligence and appropriate the resources of the Gospel, and actually "practice" the virtues (v-10), "you will never stumble; 11 for in this way the entrance into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ will be abundantly supplied to you."

So the text structure develops like this;

- 2 Pet 1:2-4 Resources, power, and process indicatives
- 2 Pet 1:5-8 imperatives grounded in the resources of 2-4 calling us to put on the virtues and practice godliness
- 2 Pet 1:9 if you lack fruit, you have forgotten the Gospel
- 2 Pet 1:10-11 if you believe 2-4, resulting in 5-8, you gain rich entrance into the kingdom

See here that life in Christ is **abundantly supplied** for those who are **diligent in faith**, **exerting God dependent effort** in the process of Sanctification. This is the **relation of faith** to **Sanctification**. It is vital to the process and its fruitful and effective outcome. Through diligent faith on the part of the believer, God's glory in image bearing is put on display in abundance.
