Eager to Preach the Gospel Romans 1:8-15

Introduction

Today we are back in the New Testament Book of Romans. Last week we looked at Paul's greeting and salutation. Paul began an important Jewish doctrinal development, explaining that the Gospel concerning God's Son, is the fulfillment of the Old Testament Scriptures, making it a fulfillment of the Jewish religion. He will begin to explain, both to Jew and Gentile, that it has always been God's purpose to save them both through His Son. This was His promise through the prophets, and Paul has been sent by God for this unique message. Jesus is therefore the fulfilment of the Davidic Covenant promise of an eternal King, and also the Son of God who was raised from the dead by the power of the Holy Spirit. This Good News has resulted in both Jew and Gentiles being called as Saints, together as God's very own covenant people through the Gospel.

In today's text, Romans 1:8-15 Paul is still continuing with his introduction. But here is a unique window into the heart of Paul, as He expresses his longing to see and fellowship with the Roman Christians, whose faith is renowned in much of the Greco-Roman world. Paul will express his desire to see their faith be fully established and encouraged, as he desires to come and share some spiritual gift with them and obtain some fruit in his ministry to them. Here Paul also reaffirms his main purpose in writing to them, his eager desire to preach the Gospel to them so as to fully establish and encourage them in their faith.

In Todays text Romans 1:8-15 we will see

- 1:8-10 Famous Roman Faith
- 1:11-13 Established and Encouraged
- 1:14-15 Eager to Preach the Gospel

Romans 15:22-25 - 22 For this reason I have often been hindered from coming to you; 23 but now, with no further place for me in these regions, and since I have had for many years a longing to come to you 24 whenever I go to Spain — for I hope to see you in passing, and to be helped on my way there by you, when I have first enjoyed your company for a while — 25 but now, I am going to Jerusalem serving the saints. NASB

And how desperately important this was for those early Christians to be established in sound doctrine, for by this time the church was under incredible attacks of false doctrine, especially from the Judaizers of the 1st Century. They distorted an understanding of the Gospel terribly. This was the reason for the Council of Elders ruling in Acts chapter 15, after Paul had disputed with so many Judaizers misleading the church for years. These matters required clear and comprehensive teaching about the fine points in the doctrines of human depravity, Justification by Faith alone, the Law and the Gospel, the deity of Christ, and eschatology. This is why Paul devotes himself to these teachings in the Book of Romans. He wants them to be "established" in the "preaching of the Gospel of God's Son."

It is of paramount importance that Christians understand that salvation is a free gift that comes to us through the Person and Work of Jesus Christ (6:23), not of any merit or works that we

can do before **God** (3:28). Whenever these doctrines are distorted, a non-Christian cult is created, because this is the most essential element of the Gospel which is intensely focused on the **Person** and **Work** of **Jesus**, who alone can **pay** the penalty for our sin with His atoning sacrifice, and merit the righteousness of God for us with his perfect life of obedience to the Law, in our place. These doctrines are called the active and passive obedience of Christ, and they deal with His life and His death and what He accomplished before God, for us, and in our place. The Divine and sinless Son of God must die as a perfect sacrifice and be received by faith alone in order for one to be declared righteous by God, a righteousness that is imputed to us by **God** that belongs to Christ. Ignorant and **foolish men** have distorted these things ever since the Gospel was first preached, and it is **imperative** that these **essential teachings** be **preserved**, lest we embrace a different Jesus and a different Gospel than the **only One** who can actually save us.

We shouldn't think that the Gospel is just the beginner's message of Christ so that one can be saved, and then we move on to other things. No indeed, we never move on from the Gospel! It is much, much more! It is the central idea in all that Christian salvation is. It shapes and forms all other doctrines in Christianity. It informs our entire belief system because it is all inter-related to the Person and the Work of Jesus. It is the reason why God created the world, to manifest His own glory and excellency as God through His eternal purpose in Christ. To be sure, there are the simple facts that God sent His Son into the world to save sinners, by living and dying in their place, and being raised from the dead as proof positive of His power over death. And we are to repent of our sins and believe upon the Lord Jesus to be saved. In its simplest form that is it.

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But the Gospel is also a complex of theological concepts and teachings that addresses not only the human need of salvation and redemption through Christ, but also the eternal judgment of wrath upon the souls of unbelieving humanity, the culmination of God's purposes for the earth and the nations, as well as the eternal blessed future of His beloved people in the New Heavens and Earth. Christ's preaching of the Gospel included not only the teaching of sin and human need for redemption, but also the ethical guidelines for faithful living and worship. He gave many wisdom related teachings designed to help us learn to walk as fruitful and productive Christ followers.

2 Timothy 3:16-4:5 - 16 All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; 17 that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work. 4 I solemnly charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by His appearing and His kingdom: 2 preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort, with great patience and instruction. 3 For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but wanting to have their ears tickled, they will accumulate for themselves teachers in accordance to their own desires; 4 and will turn away their ears from the truth, and will turn aside to myths. Romans 10:13-14 - 13 for "Whoever will call upon the name of the Lord will be saved." 14 How then shall they call upon Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? NASB
